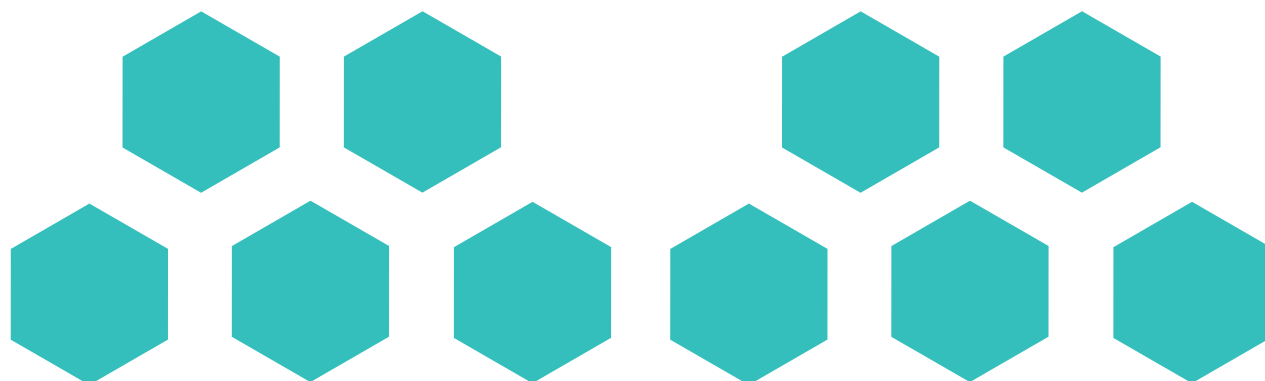

# A Message from the Dean

# Active Library: TCC Librarians in Roles Around the College and Beyond

In true TCC Library fashion, the 2018-2019 fiscal year continued with the trend of internal and external community involvement as with previous years. Tulsa Community College Library staff participated in many influential projects, teams, and workgroups at TCC and the greater Tulsa area.

Within TCC, library staff served on a multitude of hiring committees, college organizational committees and task forces, professional organizations, and college-wide student on-boarding initiatives, such as volunteering to work as greeters during the first weeks of class and staffing library information tables during new student orientations. Organizationally, librarians held positions on the Faculty Association (FA) and leadership roles on the Professional Staff Association (PSA). Librarians and library staff served on college-wide committees such as the Sustainability Committee, Information Technology Committee, and the Council Effectiveness Committee. They also successfully represented in college advisory groups, such as, the Engaged Learning Advisory Group and the Paralegal Advisory Group, which help divisions and departments make decisions on education program planning.

To improve access to low-cost resources for students as part of the college-wide initiatives, librarians began a new role as library liaisons on the eCore Design Team advising on Open Educational Resources (OER) and providing a copyright liaison for the College. The eCore Design team projects helped lower student textbook costs and provide easily accessible resources through alternative textbook solutions. Combined with a growing Interlibrary Loan (ILL) program, library staff are well on their way to combating the costly textbook and resource problem that many college students face.



Library staff additionally aided in several internal college service projects, ranging from advising on knowledge and records management to completing open records requests and advising on cloud-based storage solutions for the College. Many of these initiatives are ongoing and remain vital to day-to-day college operations.

Outside of the College, library employees held leadership positions in the Oklahoma chapter of the Association of College and Research Libraries (OK-ACRL), Beta Phi Mu (the international honor society for library and information studies), and the Oklahoma Association of Libraries (OLA). Librarians were also involved in the Community of Oklahoma Instruction Librarians (COIL), Health Librarians of Eastern Oklahoma Consortia (HeLEO), as well as training and professional development opportunities with the Medical Library Association (MLA) and the Oklahoma Department of Libraries (ODL). Librarians presented in various capacities at several workshops and conferences associated with these organizations this past year, often presenting on new and relevant topics for the community college and library environment.



# Building a Comprehensive Open Educational Resources Program

**A**s efforts to expand use of Open Educational Resources (OER) increase throughout Oklahoma and across the country, librarians Liz Binger, Jennifer Hulsey Campbell, Jamie Holmes and Amy Lagers are working to facilitate increased use of OER within the College. Led by Northeast Campus Library Director Lisa Haldeman, the Library's OER Team has studied the open movement and related issues, worked with faculty to create OER for a variety of courses, and created materials to inform faculty about the movement and the benefits of using OER.

In addition to presenting at various professional development events, the OER Team has created an online guide, [OER 101](#), to support all interested faculty. It provides a general overview of the open movement, a detailed explanation of Creative Commons (CC) licensing, and a link to the Library's extensive guide to copyright law as it applies to education, as well as information on accessibility and how librarians can provide support. For faculty members who are ready to incorporate OER into their courses, they have included a portal to searchable OER repositories and digital libraries.

Building upon the Library's earlier, less formal efforts to advance use of OER, current OER team members have since collaborated with faculty in different disciplines to assist with the curation of open materials to create new open textbooks. Courses with newly developed OER include Composition 1 and 2, U.S. History - Civil War Era to the Present, Introduction to Psychology, Nutrition, and General Biology for Non-Majors.



Until recently, only a small number of faculty were using these materials. However, the history department has determined that three high enrollment courses, United States History (both pre and post-Civil War) and American Federal Government, will begin using OpenStax in many sections college wide. While a detailed accounting of the cost savings to students to date is not currently available, it is estimated that the savings is near \$1 million, and the figure is expected to grow significantly.

Of course, there are other benefits to students when courses use OER, including offering exposure to the highest quality information available. For example, a biology lab manual was compiled from seven different OER lab manuals to provide students with the best pieces from each work, and this simply would not be possible without OER and the Creative Commons license.

The OER team is excited about what's next for OER at TCC, having recently learned that Lisa Haldeman has been selected as a 2019-2020 OER Research Fellow with the Open Education Group. That experience will guide the creation of a plan for data collection to more concretely show the direct impact of OER adoption on students. Also, the OER team will be working this summer to earn Creative Commons certificates to further enhance their understanding of the open education movement and their ability to collaborate with and assist faculty in OER efforts.



# TCC Celebrates 50 Years as a Leader in the Tulsa Community

**T**ulsa Junior College began as a fledgling institution in September 1970. 50 years later, TCC has grown to become a long-standing establishment in the community and one that is respected state and nationwide for forward-thinking movements in higher education, such as the Tulsa Achieves program and the Pathways Initiative. Next year, TCC will be celebrating 50 great years as a pillar in the Tulsa community and the College will be kicking off the anniversary with an exhibit highlighting the College's history.

Over the last year, the College Archives at TCC's Northeast Campus has been working diligently with two firms on the planning of the 50th Anniversary Exhibit at the Tulsa Historical Society. Public relations firm, Schnake, Turnbo, and Frank, and event planning firm, Rumbledrum, have worked alongside Andy Taylor to create the event, opening August 1, 2019. The College Archives has played a major role in this effort by supplying historical items such as pictures, documents, regalia, digital files, and other collection pieces that will be displayed throughout the exhibit.

The College will also be using the TCC Library Digital Collection, which contains many digital files, pictures, stories, and video and audio clips to support the 50th Anniversary. The TCC Marketing Department plans to post various selections of the Digital Collection to the College's Facebook page over the next few months to increase interest in the exhibit. Items from the College Archives will be moved to the Tulsa Historical Society in mid-July, and the exhibit will open to the public starting in August 2019 and run through March 2020. After the exhibit closes, the celebration of the 50th Anniversary will continue throughout the year.





# HLC at TCC: A Team Effort Throughout the Accreditation Process

In September 2018, TCC hosted a visit of peer reviewers from the Higher Learning Commission (HLC). Dr. Lisa Gerow, nursing faculty, and Dean Paula Settoon, the College's Accreditation Liaison Officer, chaired the HLC Assurance Committee and took the lead in hosting the visitors, who came from similar institutions around the central United States. TCC Library employees helped with the process by collecting evidence, doing research, and proofreading the final draft of the assurance argument.

In December 2018, the College received notification that TCC's accreditation had been officially reaffirmed by the HLC with the results of their Institutional Action Council coming almost two months earlier than expected.

The reaffirmation is the result of years of work, but that work is ongoing. Accredited status is not for a specific amount of time. Instead, it represents a continuing relationship between the institution and accrediting agency, which in this case is the Higher Learning Commission.

The review team rated TCC highly overall but were concerned about the College's student learning assessment practices. A sound assessment infrastructure has been developed, but not yet fully implemented. Therefore, HLC is requiring that TCC provide a comprehensive update regarding assessment practices along with results and actions in 2022 as part of a mid-cycle Assurance Review. Reviewers will not return to campus until 2028-29, but a full report is due in fall 2022. That report should contain evidence of how the College uses student outcome metrics to make decisions about curriculum and teaching strategies. Between 2023 and 2028, the College will participate in a quality improvement project.

Accreditation is crucial for several reasons; most importantly, qualifying students for financial aid as well as ensuring that students are able to transfer credit hours to other institutions of higher education. Additionally, accreditation is affirmation that TCC operates in the right way, meeting HLC's criteria and incorporating best practices for students, faculty, staff and the Tulsa community. Accreditation validates the strategic plan and the Guided Pathways work the College has embraced.

While Dr. Gerow and Dean Settoon led the effort, the entire process was most assuredly a team effort. Faculty, staff, and students represented the College well and impressed reviewers with their dedication to TCC's mission.



# Focus on Focus Groups

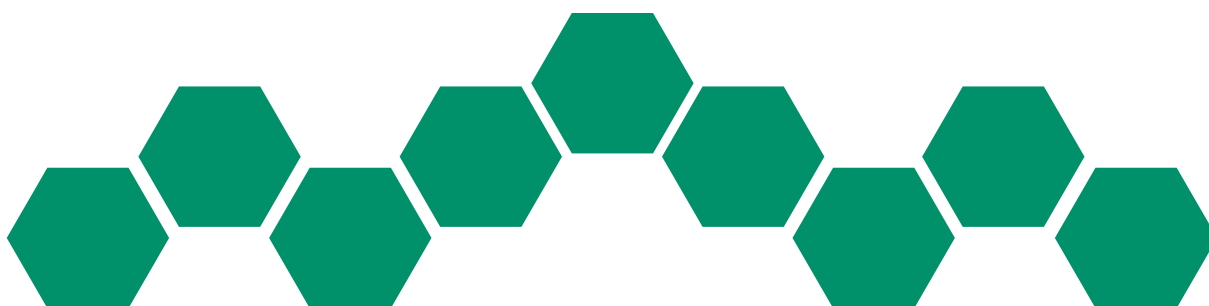

**T**he TCC Library entered a new phase of assessment in spring 2019 with the implementation of focus groups. These groups gathered student feedback about library services and student study habits. This is the first time the TCC Library has held focus groups to gather qualitative data from library users at a college-wide level. The data from these focus group sessions will complement an ongoing data-driven longitudinal study on how library services impact student success.

Librarians worked with members of the College's Institutional Research and Assessment (IR&A) department to design and implement these focus groups. Librarians provided IR&A with questions to build an instrument that would assess users on a variety of library services and student study habits. These questions included the impact of library services on critical thinking skills, how library spaces affected study habits, popular services, and future services. IR&A took librarian survey questions and refined them using assessment best practices. IR&A then administered the survey in a focus group setting to volunteers from the library user population.

The results of the focus groups provided interesting and unexpected insight into patron library use, such as preferences for lighting and seating. It also identified barriers to service at key contact points in the Library. Moving forward, the TCC Library intends to hold additional focus groups and build a knowledge base that will help the department make data-driven decisions that affect library services.

The longitudinal study just completed its full academic year of data collection for nine service categories including information literacy instruction, research consultations, e-resources usage, use of study rooms and computers, virtual reference, interlibrary loans, reserves, and traditional circulation. Library services data will be statistically correlated to measures of student performance and success. While the focus groups and the longitudinal study suggest library usage correlates strongly with the development of academic and critical thinking skills, at least 3 years of data collection are necessary to paint the full picture.



# The Library Collaborates to Reach the Community

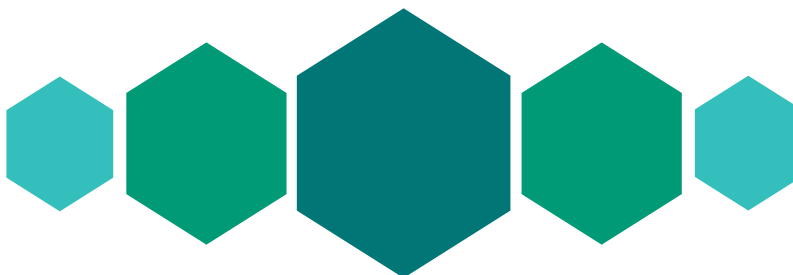
**T**CC Library is an integral part of the College community. Not only is the Library an essential resource for student success, it also plays an active role in fostering student engagement as well as giving students a physical space to utilize within the TCC community. Library staff work with schools and departments across the College to offer collaborative programs and events, such as Stress Free Zones, Canines and Coffee during finals week, and pop-up theatre scenes performed in the Library throughout the year.

One such program is Pause for Paws. The Library joined with TCC's Wellness Services and Tulsa area organization TLC Therapy Dogs to bring dogs to the four main campuses during the fall and spring semesters. The program gained in popularity this year as students no longer must wait until finals week to relax with a furry friend.

The Library has also collaborated with the TCC Theater Department by promoting some of their productions. In addition to creating library displays for theater performances, the Library has also been the location of pop-up scenes in which actors perform a scene from their current production. The first production the Library held a pop-up scene for was *Antigone*, the Greek tragedy by Sophocles. The second pop-up scene was from the science fiction classic *War of the Worlds* by H.G. Wells. Library patrons and staff enjoyed both scenes and look forward to more in the future.

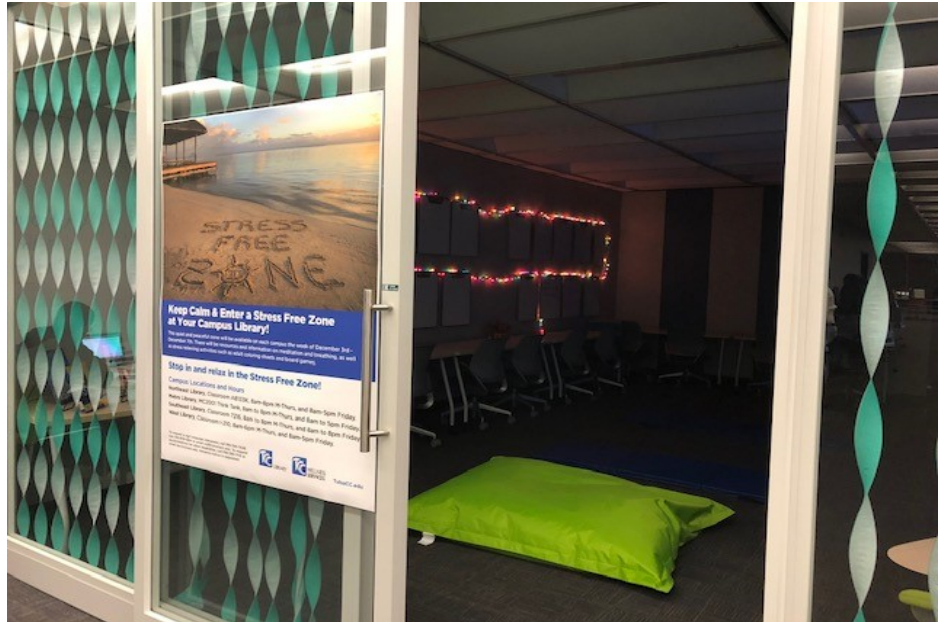
TCC Library has also reached out to the broader community through events such as Louder Than a Bomb: University (LTAB-U), a yearly poetry slam. 2019 marked the sixth year that TCC has hosted this community event. TCC students competed alongside students from the University of Oklahoma and Jenks High School. The event was promoted across the College as well as to student clubs, coffee houses and other local colleges. Faculty and library staff judged the competition. Members of the greater Tulsa community volunteered as the opening poets for each of the event's three rounds. Winners received trophies and cash prizes provided by the TCC Foundation.

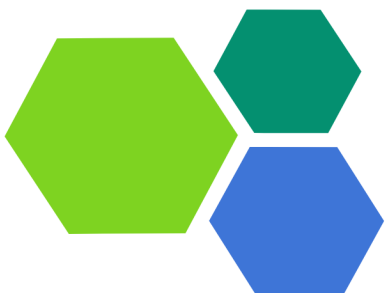
