(Picture Book) It's up to Daddy to give his daughter an extra-special hair style in this ode to self-confidence and the love between fathers and daughters, from Academy-Award winning director and former NFL wide receiver Matthew A. Cherry and New York Times bestselling illustrator Vashti Harrison.

### Black Brother, Black Brother by Jewell Parker Rhodes

(Chapter Book) From award-winning and bestselling author Jewell Parker Rhodes comes a powerful coming-of-age story about two brothers, one who presents as white, the other as black, and the complex ways in which they are forced to navigate the world, all while training for a fencing competition.

### Stamped by Jason Reynolds & Ibram X. Kendi

(Young Adult Book) A timely, crucial, and empowering exploration of racism – and antiracism – in America. This remarkable reimagining of Dr. Ibram X. Kendi's National Book Award-winning Stamped from the Beginning reveals the history of racist ideas in America, and inspires hope for an antiracist future. It proves that while racist ideas have always been easy to fabricate and distribute, they can also be discredited.

### **Our Time is Now by Stacey Abrams**

(Adult Companion Book) A recognized expert on fair voting and civic engagement, Abrams gives a chilling account of how the right to vote has been and continues to be under attack.
