



ne of the most appealing aspects of a recording, in my view, is whether it can pass the "multiple/repeated listening" test. In other words, is there enough musical substance present to sustain interest beyond the initial listening session. Drummer/bandleader Brandon Sanders and his talented assemblage of musicians pass this test with flying colors on his debut recording **Compton's** Finest. Produced by fellow Angeleno, drummer Willie Jones III, the recording highlights a wonderful exuberance and joy of swinging by Sanders and company.

The tunes selected provide ample space for creative musical statements from all members. Tenor saxophonist Chris Lewis, vibraphonist Warren Wolf, and pianist Keith Brown get things rolling right away with expressive solos on the opening tune "Softly, as in a Morning Sunrise," as Sanders and bassist Eric Wheeler provide an energetic, upbeat foundation.

"Compton's Finest," a minor blues, plants the band firmly in a medium tempo groove and allows everyone to demonstrate their blues roots. Bassist Wheeler also gets a chance to shine on this one. Kenny Barron's new standard "Voyage" is just that—a musical journey. We're treated to engaging solos by Brown, Wolf, and Lewis, followed by a tasty drum solo chorus by Sanders.

The featured vocalist on the session, Jazzmeia Horn, demonstrates her wonderful vocal skills on the group's interpretation of the Stevie Wonder-penned "I Can't Help It," which was made popular by Michael Jackson. Horn also sings beautifully on the classic Ellington standard "In a Sentimental Mood," done here with a relaxed bossa nova feel.

"Monk's Dream" gives the group an opportunity to dig into the "vibe" of Thelonious Monk, again featuring fine solos from Lewis, Wolf, Brown, and Wheeler, along with the ever-present swinging groove of Sanders. The classic evergreen standard "Body and Soul" puts the spotlight on tenor saxophonist Lewis, as he, Brown, and Wolf demonstrate their ballad interpretation skills. The final selection, the bluesy, funky "SJB," has a danceable groove reminiscent of Eddie Harris's "Listen Here." Definitely "feel good" music!

Again, drummer and bandleader Brandon Sanders, who may certainly be considered one of "compton's finest," has assembled a fantastic group of musicians who succeed in creating music which is moving, engaging, and merits repeated listening!

I would like to thank Barney Fields for believing in me and my music enough to put it out on one of the most respected labels in the music business, Savant.
