"Hope smiles from the threshold of the year to come, whispering, 'Will it be happier." I came across these words of Alfred Lord Tennyson recently and they gave me pause. I had to read the sentence several times. Something didn't make sense. Something was odd or missing. It didn't seem all that hopeful. And that's when it hit me. I read it wrong. Here's what is actually says, "Hope smiles from the threshold of the year to come, whispering, 'It will be happier." Ah! This word reversal is a window is maybe into how I'm really feeling as we cross the threshold from 2021 to 2022.

At the Threshold of the Year

These are challenging, difficult times. It's been an exhausting year. Change is all around us—in our lives, families, communities, and the church. It will feel very different come January without Shirley Winters in the church office. Just when we were settling into a new normal, the latest COVID-19 surge is upending everything. Many are bracing for what we will face in January. In Roman mythology, Janus, namesake of January, was the god of gates, the god of beginnings and transitions. Janus was depicted with two faces; one looks backward and the other forward.

Despite my trepidations, I generally like threshold places. And I love this reflection by John O' Donohue — poet, priest, gifted writer who had a beautiful soul— on the gift and promise of being in between; from his remarkable book To Bless the Space Between Us (2008). "At any time," he writes, "you can ask yourself: At which threshold am I now standing? At this time in my life, what am I leaving? Where am I about to enter? What is preventing me from crossing my next threshold? What gift would enable me to do it? A threshold is not a simple boundary; it is a frontier that divides two different territories, rhythms, and atmospheres. Indeed, it is a lovely testimony to the fullness and integrity of an experience or stage of life that it intensifies toward the end into a real frontier that cannot be crossed without the heart being passionately engaged and woken up. At this

threshold a great complexity of emotion comes alive: confusion, fear, excitement, sadness, hope. This is one of the reasons such vital crossings were always clothed in ritual. It is wise in your own life to be able to recognize and acknowledge the key thresholds: to take your time; to feel all the varieties of presence that accrue there; to listen inward with complete attention until you hear the inner voice calling you forward. The time has come to cross."

Perhaps this is why I'm drawn to the European tradition of chalking doorways on the Feast of Epiphany (January 6), a custom which might have originated with Christians from Alexandria in the third century. Next year, thresholds will be chalked: 20 + C + M + B + 22. The letters C, M, B have two meanings. First, they represent the traditional names of the Magi (Caspar, Melchior and Balthasar), which emerged in the sixth century. The initials "C, M, B" are also an abbreviation for the Latin words Christus Mansionem Benedicat, "May Christ Bless this Home." The "+" signs represent the cross, and the numbers to the left and right are the year. It's a way to celebrate the occasion of the Epiphany and to ask God's blessing on our lives, our homes, and those who visit our homes throughout the new year. The time has come to cross.

SESSION MEETING Highlights from December



Your Session continues to meet monthly and is using Zoom to meet online in view of the coronavirus pandemic restrictions. Following are highlights from the Session meeting on December 1, 2021.

- The Session received a proposal from the Board of Trustees to dissolve the Trustees as a separate board and fold their functions into a committee of Session. Members of this "Facilities and Grounds" committee (actual name to be determined) could be unelected members of the congregation at-large and not serve fixed terms. Session will be considering this proposal going forward. To be enacted it will require a Bylaws change and a vote of the congregation.
- The Call for the Annual Meeting of the Congregation was approved by Session. The meeting will be held following worship on Sunday, January 30, 2022.
- The Finance Committee reported that a budget deficit remains, and if members will bring their pledges and contributions up to date before the end of the year a balanced budget can be expected. Committee chairs and others with charge of budget accounts are requested to submit their budget requests for 2022 to the Finance Committee as soon as possible.
- The Personnel Committee is in the process of writing the job description and advertising and interviewing candidates for the Office Administrator position, to be available after the retirement of Shirley Winters at the end of the year.
- The Mission Committee reported that the recent Catonsville food drive collected 2.37 tons of food in time for Thanksgiving. CPC also helped to support over 200 meals from Grace AME's food pantry. Our "Christmas at Sea" appeal for the Seafarers Center has collected \$1,300 from our congregation, more than enough to fill their gift bags and leave some additional funds to donate to the Center.

Session recognizes the need to continually communicate with our membership, and we welcome your suggestions for communication exchange. Session member contact information is listed in the Church Directory, so it is easier than ever to communicate directly with your church leaders. Take a few minutes to send a message to a Session member, the pastors or the church office, and let us know what you think. We want to hear from you!

... FOR SUCH A TIME AS THIS? Esther 4: I 4B

I became a Stephen Minister about 15 years ago in my church in California. It was one of the greatest blessings in my life to have the opportunity to make a difference in the lives of three women who were experiencing recovery from a divorce, anticipating the death of a father, and facing a fatal illness. The excellent training and continuing support from other Stephen Ministers were instrumental in helping me provide appropriate care to my care receivers. Recognizing that it wasn't my job to fix things but simply to provide care and let God provide the cure freed me from the fear of failure or doing something wrong.

As a member of CPC, I often thought we would benefit from a Stephen Ministry program, but COVID brought that need to the forefront of my mind. I've been overwhelmed by the support of our pastors, deacons, and session in this journey that started several months ago. But the journey is just beginning. It will still be several months before we have trained Stephen Ministers to provide care to those in our congregation and community who are experiencing critical life challenges.

Are you here "for such a time as this?" Do you feel called to help someone who needs you to walk beside them while they work through a difficult or challenging time? If you are considering this awesome opportunity, reach out to one of our Stephen Leaders. They can provide you with more information and an application if you decide to move forward. Applications will be accepted through the end of January, followed by interviews of each applicant before a final decision is made by the applicant and leaders that this service is right for them at this time. Training is expected to begin in March or April to have a group of trained Stephen Leaders ready to serve others by the end of June 2022. Now is the time for you to make a decision. Please keep Stephen Ministry in your prayers as we move forward. Thanks to members and friends of our congregation for the very successful fall completed. Please know you have made an impact on the lives of so many who need our help. Your generosity, support, and help have been much appreciated by your Mission Committee and the recipients of our gifts. Thanks to Lee Van Koten and Sid Turner for delivering our kits to New Windsor and our Seafarer gifts to the Center in Baltimore.

The 202 Church World Service (CWS) Hygiene kits were delivered to the New Windsor warehouse in late October. After our bills were finalized, we are very pleased to share the news that \$404 was sent to CWS Headquarters in Elkhardt, IN for the shipping and handling fees of the kits. Church World Service is so grateful for your support for making hygiene kits this year. 200 kits is amazing, and will support some of the most vulnerable people here on the US border, and in places like Haiti. I hope we can make this an annual tradition for supporting those in need. We also provided a donation of \$1735.54 to be used as part of their ongoing Hygiene Kit fund.

Our Seafarers kits were completed on December 4 by a group of CPC volunteers. We were able to provide 52 kits and a financial donation of \$1002.70 for the Center. We have received a message from Rev. Mary Davisson, Director of the Center. In her message she asks, "Please share with the members of CPC our grateful thanks for the generous gift of 52 Christmas at Sea packages. For many crews, this is their second Christmas in a row with no prospect of shore leave and no opportunity to buy special holiday items. These gifts are especially meaningful this year. We are so grateful that you have chosen to support this ministry. Thanks and Christmas Blessings."
