

Background of Executive Order 20-44

 The Executive Order (EO) was issued on February 20, 2020, as a result of the exorbitant compensation payouts for the executive leadership team of the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence.

The EO is comprised of 4 Sections.





REQUIREMENTS



Section 1 Requirements

All Executive agencies must submit to the Executive Office of the Governor, within 45 days of this Order, a list of:

- a. All entities named in statute with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement; and
- b. All entities that through contract or other agreement with the State, annually receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Section 2 Requirements

Within 45 days of submission of the list, each agency obtain and review copies of the IRS Form 990 and other documentation for each listed entity showing total compensation... for all members of the listed contractors' executive leadership teams for the past year.

If the compensation totals exceed limits set forth in federal or state law and regulations, the agency shall refer the matter to the Office of the Chief Inspector General for investigations and appropriate action.



Section 3 Requirements

Within 45 days of submission of the list from Section 1 of this Order, each Executive agency must verify compliance with the Florida Single Audit Act and develop, for submission to the OCIG, an appropriate corrective action plan for non-compliance or any issues noted, and a timeline for completion of the corrective action plans.

Section 4 Requirements

Each Executive agency shall henceforth require, from entities that meet the criteria listed in Section 1 of this Order, an annual report, including the most recent IRS Form 990, detailing the total compensation for the entities' executive leadership teams...

- The Office of Chief Inspector General created an excel template to facilitate the collection of data for Sections 1-3 of the EO.
- Several fields were provided as the data criteria, which were to be completed by each applicable agency.
- A set of instructions were included in the template as guidance for the agencies.

Required Fields: General Information

The following general information were required for all Sections (1-3):

- Name of the State Agency
- Point of Contact (POC) for the State Agency
- Contact Information of the POC
- Entity's name or title
- Federal Employer Identification Number

Required Fields: Key Information (S. 1)

Section 1 – Sole Source & Government Funding:

- Indication whether the entity is named in statute with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement.
- Statute reference for applicable sole-source entity.
- Indication whether the funds received from the state, or from a combination of state and federal funds, are equal to or greater than 50% of the entity's total budget.

Required Fields: Key Information (S. 2)

Section 2 – Compensation Limits:

- Indication whether a compensation limit is applicable to the entity's executive leadership team.
- Statute reference for the limit applicability.
- Compensation limit amount, if applicable.
- Indication whether the total compensation exceeds the applicable limit.
- Total compensation of the entity's Executive Team.

Required Fields: Key Information (S. 3)

Section 3 – Florida Single Audit Act (FSAA):

- Indication whether the entity is required to have a Florida Single Audit.
- Indication whether the entity has filed the single audit, as required per FSAA (compliant).
- Indication whether there are single audit findings/issues noted for noncompliance, including the number of findings.
- Indication whether there is an appropriate action plan for each non-compliance, along with the appropriate timeline for plan completion.

Overview of Agency Responses

We requested and obtained the required information from 36 state agencies.

According to the responses provided:

- Twenty-two agencies met the criteria set forth in the EO.
- The remaining 14 agencies do not meet the criteria listed in the EO; thus, these agencies were not required to provide additional information.

Responding Agencies

- We obtained relevant data from the 22 applicable agencies by using the template, to complete the EO Sections 1 – 3.
- No data reliability testing was performed for the obtained information.

RESULTS OF OUR REVIEW

Section 1 – Results of Review

Approximately 839 unique entities were applicable to Section 1 of the EO:

- Section 1(a)
 - Approx. 165 unique entities were named in statute with which the agency must for a solesource, public private agreement.
- Section 1(b)
 - Approx. 675 unique entities annually receive
 50% or more of their budget from the state or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Section 1 – Government Funding

<u>Note</u>: The **known** government funding amounts above are not inclusive of all entities applicable to Section 1 due to insufficient information provided in the state agencies' responses.



Section 2 – Requirements Recap

If the compensation totals (of the listed entity's executive team) exceed limits set forth in federal or state law and regulations, the agency shall refer the matter to the Office of the Chief Inspector General for investigations and appropriate action.

Section 2 – Results of Review

We compiled **169 entities** in which **compensatory limits are applicable to the executive leadership teams**, as set forth in federal/state law & regulations:

- Of which, 160 entities <u>do not</u> have excess compensations (compliant).
- Of which, 12 entities have excess compensations per statute.

Section 2 – Results of Review

The 12 entities with excess compensations were contracted with the 2 state agencies below.

- Department of Children and Families (DCF)
 - 9 entities
 - The excess compensations were noted as findings in the DCF Inspector General Reports.
- Department of Education
 - 3 entities
 - The excess compensations were reimbursed to the Office of Early Learning as disallowed costs.

Section 2 – Outstanding Information



Currently, there are **41 entities** with outstanding information regarding the applicability of the entities' compensatory limit and compliance, all of which are contracted with the **Department of Health (DOH)**.

The total **State** funding for the 41 DOH entities with outstanding information is approximately \$64,799,841.



Section 3 – Requirements Recap

Each Executive agency must verify compliance with the Florida Single Audit Act and develop, for submission to the OCIG, an appropriate corrective action plan (CAP) for non-compliance or any issues noted, and a timeline for completion of the CAPs.

Section 3 – Results of Review

Based on the obtained responses, there are **194 entities** contracted with the state which are **subjected to FSAA**. Out of those 194 entities:

- 154 entities have no single audit finding (FSAA compliant; no CAP).
- 39 entities have one or more single audit findings (FSAA compliant; CAP in place).
- 1 entity with a pending Single Audit.

Executive Order Number 20-44

On February 20, 2020, the Governor of Florida issued Executive Order number 20-44 (EO 20-44), as a result of the uncovered exorbitant executive leadership team compensation payouts for the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence.¹

What We Did

The Office of Chief Inspector General created a Microsoft Excel template³ to facilitate the collection of data for the Executive Order, distributed the template to all (36) state agencies, and obtained the necessary data to complete the Executive Order. Upon receiving the state agencies' responses, we consolidated and normalized⁴ the obtained data for further analyzation.

Out of the responding 36 state agencies:5

- A total of 22 agencies met the criteria set forth in the Executive Order.
- A total of 14 agencies do not meet the criteria listed in the Executive Order.

We obtained relevant data from the 22 applicable agencies to complete Sections 1 through 3 of the Executive Order. However, we did not perform a data reliability testing on the obtained information.

What We Observed

Section 1

We compiled an approximate⁶ total of **839 unique entities**⁷ (860 line items) which are applicable to Section 1. Out of those entities:⁸

- a. Approximately 165 unique entities (171 line items) are named in statute with which the agency (state agencies) must form a sole-source, public-private agreement.
- b. Approximately **675 unique entities** (691 line items), through contract or other agreement with the State, annually receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Total **known** government funding amounts for Section 1⁹ in a fiscal year are approximately¹⁰ as follows:

- State funding: at least 3.9 billion dollars
- Federal funding: at least 3.4 billion dollars

Note: The **known** government funding amounts above are not inclusive of all 839 unique entities applicable to Section 1. Funding amounts could not be determined for several entities due to:

- Insufficient information regarding budget amounts and/or funding proportions; 11 and
- Percentage errors¹² in the responses provided by the state agencies.¹³

We obtained a response for one entity, Douglas-Braxton Inc. (contracted with the Department of Health), with no information regarding the status of its contract. It is currently unknown whether the entity was named in statute with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement.

Additionally, one entity, Living Stones International (contracted with the Department of Juvenile Justice), is categorized as a non-sole source entity¹⁴ in the Department's response. However, it is currently unknown whether the entity, through contract or other agreement with the state, receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Section 2

We compiled a total of 169 entities for which compensatory limits are applicable to the executive leadership teams, as set forth in federal or state law and regulations. Out of the 169 entities:

- A total of 160 entities do not have excess compensations.
- A total of 12 entities have excess compensations, as mandated in the statute:
 - Nine of the 12 entities are contracted with the Department of Children Families (DCF). The excess compensations¹⁵ were noted as findings in the DCF Inspector General reports.
 - Three¹⁶ of the 12 entities are contracted with the Department of Education. The excess compensations¹⁷ were returned to the Office of Early Learning as disallowed costs.¹⁸

We also gathered 41 entities with outstanding information regarding the applicability of compensatory limit and compliance, specifically:

- whether compensation limit is applicable to the entities per statute;
- whether any of the entities' total compensations exceed such limit, if applicable; and
- whether any of the entities must be referred to the CIG for further investigation, due to the excess compensations.

All 41 entities are contracted with the Department of Health (DOH).

The total <u>State</u> funding for the 41 DOH entities with outstanding information is approximately \$64,799,841.

Section 3

We compiled 194 entities contracted with the State which are subject to the Florida Single Audit Act (FSAA). Out of the 194 entities:

- A total of 154 entities have no single audit finding.
- A total of 39 entities have one or more findings.
- FSAA for 1 entity is pending completion.

Out of the 39 entities with one or more single audit findings:

- Twenty-six entities are contracted with the Department of Education.
- One entity is contracted with the Department of Environmental Protection.
- Five entities are contracted with the Department of Children and Families.
- One entity is contracted with the Department of Elder Affairs.
- Six entities are contracted with the Department of Economic Opportunity.

The five state agencies (listed above) noted in their responses, that corrective actions and timeline of completion have been obtained, or are otherwise in the process of being obtained for the applicable entities.

We also observed one entity, Homosassa Civic Club, Inc. (contracted with the Department of Environmental Protection), with a pending single audit due June 30, 2021.

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BACKGROUND AND INTRODUCTION

Requirements of Executive Order 20-44

On February 20, 2020, the Executive Office of the Governor¹⁹ issued Executive Order Number 20-44 (EO 20-44), which is comprised of four sections. The requirements for each section are outlined below.

Section 1

All Executive agencies must submit to the Executive Office of the Governor, within 45 days of this Order, ²⁰ a list of:

- a. All entities named in statute with which the agency must form a **sole-source**, **public-private agreement**; and
- b. All entities that through contract or other agreement with the State, annually receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Section 2

Within 45 days of submission of the list, each agency must obtain and review copies of the IRS Form 990 and other documentation for each listed entity showing total compensation – to include salary, bonuses, cashed-in leave, cash equivalents, severance pay, retirement benefits, deferred compensation, real-property gifts, and any other payout – for all members of the listed contractors' executive leadership teams for the past year.

If the compensation totals exceed limits set forth in federal or state law and regulations, the agency shall refer the matter to the Office of the Chief Inspector General (OCIG) for investigations and appropriate action.

Section 3

In addition, within 45 days of submission of the list from Section 1 of this Order, each Executive agency must verify compliance with the Florida Single Audit Act and develop, for submission to the OCIG, an appropriate **corrective action plan for non-compliance or any issues noted, and a timeline for completion of the corrective action plans**.

Section 4

Each Executive agency shall henceforth require, from entities that meet the criteria listed in Section 1 of this Order, an annual report, including the most recent IRS Form 990, detailing the total compensation for the entities' executive leadership teams. Total compensation shall include salary, bonuses, cashed-in leave, cash equivalents, severance pay, retirement benefits, deferred compensation, real-property gifts, and any other payout.

In addition, contracted entities must agree through appropriate contract or grant agreement amendment to inform the agency of any changes in total executive compensation between the annual reports. All compensation reports must indicate what percent of compensation comes directly from the State or Federal allocations to the contracted entity.

The Office of Chief Inspector General (OCIG) created an excel template to facilitate the procurement of data for EO 20-44.

Several fields were provided as the data criteria, which were to be completed by each applicable agency. (See Appendix A for a complete listing of the required fields).

RESULTS OF REVIEW

EO 20-44 Responses

In accordance with the Executive Order (EO) 20-44, we obtained responses from 36 state agencies. Out of those 36 agencies:²¹

- twenty-two agencies met the criteria set forth in EO 20-44 for Sections 1 3; and
- the remaining 14 agencies do not meet the criteria listed in EO 20-44; thus, they are not required to provide the required data for Sections 1 through 3.

We obtained relevant data from the 22 applicable agencies to complete Sections 1 through 3 of the EO and to perform further analysis, as outlined below; however, **we did not perform a data reliability testing on the obtained information**.

Section 1 - Sole Source and Government Funding

We compiled an approximate²² total of 839 unique entities²³ (860 line items) applicable to Section 1. ²⁴

a. There are approximately 165 unique entities (171 line items) **named in statute** with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement. These entities are applicable to Section 1(a) of the Executive Order.

Outstanding Information

We observed one entity, Douglas-Braxton Inc. (contracted with the <u>Department of Health</u>), with insufficient information regarding the status of its contract. It is currently unknown whether the entity was named in statute with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement.

Additionally, one entity, Living Stones International (contracted with the Department of Juvenile Justice), is categorized as a non-sole source entity³¹ in the Department's response. However, it is currently unknown whether the entity, through contract or other agreement with the state, receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Section 2 – Compensation Limits

- the entity must be referred to the CIG for further investigation due to excess compensations.

All 41 entities are contracted with the <u>Department of Health</u>.

The total <u>State</u> funding for the 41 DOH entities with outstanding information is approximately \$64,799,841.

We compiled 194 entities contracted with the state which are **subjected to FSAA**.

Out of those 194 entities:

- A total of 154 entities have no single audit finding.
- A total of 39 entities have one or more findings.
- FSAA for 2 entities are pending completion.

STATE OF FLORIDA

OFFICE OF THE GOVERNOR EXECUTIVE ORDER NUMBER 20-44

WHEREAS, the Florida Coalition Against Domestic Violence (Coalition) submitted documents to the Executive Office of the Governor and Florida House of Representatives on February 12, 2020, revealing that the Coalition used funds from the Department of Children and Families to subsidize exorbitant executive leadership team compensation payouts; and

WHEREAS, information indicates the number of survivors turned away from domestic violence shelters around the State grew as the Coalition increasingly directed State-allocated funds to executive team compensation; and

WHEREAS, upon receiving evidence of the Coalition's fiscal irresponsibility, I ordered the Office of the Chief Inspector General to conduct a thorough review of the Coalition's compensation practices and to refer the matter for additional investigation, if necessary; and

WHEREAS, several provisions of law require various Executive agencies to enter solesource contracts or other agreements with certain private entities on a non-competitive basis; and

WHEREAS, section 39.903, Fla. Stat., provides one example by requiring the Department of Children and Families to contract with the Coalition for the delivery and management of services for the State's domestic violence program; and

WHEREAS, significant State funds are directed to private organizations through mandatory, non-competitive State contracts and other public-private agreements; and

WHEREAS, Florida law requires that each agency include in contracts with outside organizations appropriate audit and oversight authority and agency access to documents, papers, letters, or other material made or received by the contractor in conjunction with the contract; and

WHEREAS, public-private partnerships effectively serve the People of Florida only when good stewards of State funds lead the partnership and uphold the values of transparency and accountability.

NOW, THEREFORE, I, RON DESANTIS, as Governor of Florida, by virtue of the authority vested in me by Article IV, Section 1(a) of the Florida Constitution, and all other applicable laws, promulgate the following Executive Order, to take immediate effect:

Section 1. I hereby direct all Executive agencies to submit to the Executive Office of the Governor, within 45 days of this Order, a list of: (a) all entities named in statute with which the agency must form a sole-source, public-private agreement; and (b) all entities that, through contract or other agreement with the State, annually receive 50% or more of their budget from the State or from a combination of State and Federal funds.

Section 2. I further direct that, within 45 days of submission of the list, each agency obtain and review copies of the IRS Form 990 and other documentation for each listed entity showing total compensation—to include salary, bonuses, cashed-in leave, cash equivalents, severance pay, retirement benefits, deferred compensation, real-property gifts, and any other payout—for all members of the listed contractors' executive leadership teams for the past year. If the compensation totals exceed limits set forth in federal or state law and regulations, the agency shall refer the matter to the Office of the Chief Inspector General for investigation and appropriate action.

Section 3. In addition, within 45 days of submission of the list from Section 1 of this Order, each Executive agency must verify compliance with the Florida Single Audit Act and develop, for submission to the Office of the Chief Inspector General, an appropriate corrective

action plan for non-compliance or any issues noted, and a timeline for completion of the corrective action plans.

Section 4. Each Executive agency shall henceforth require, from entities that meet the criteria listed in Section 1 of this Order, an annual report, including the most recent IRS Form 990, detailing the total compensation for the entities' executive leadership teams. Total compensation shall include salary, bonuses, cashed-in leave, cash equivalents, severance pay, retirement benefits, deferred compensation, real-property gifts, and any other payout. In addition, contracted entities must agree through appropriate contract or grant agreement amendment to inform the agency of any changes in total executive compensation between the annual reports. All compensation reports must indicate what percent of compensation comes directly from the State or Federal allocations to the contracted entity.
