

Alternatives to Incarceration Grant Award Recipients

Capital Region

- Columbia County Probation Department: \$45,000 for pre-trial expanded release under supervision services.
- Washington County Alternative Sentencing Agency: \$116,750 for ATI-enhanced TASC, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.

Central New York

- Catholic Charities of Syracuse: \$70,230 for a sex offender treatment program (a specialized population program).
- Cayuga Counseling Services: \$35,704 for Thinking for a Change, a cognitive-behavioral intervention.
- Center for Community Alternatives, Inc. (Onondaga County): \$250,000 for Client Specific Planning, a defender-based advocacy program.

Finger Lakes

- Pre-Trial Services of Monroe County: \$191,556 for the Detention Reduction Assessment Project, a pre-trial release program.
- Wayne ARC (three grants): \$241,170 for Wayne ARC Recourse, a pre-trial release program; \$109,106 for a defender-based advocacy program; and \$129,894 for Wayne ARC Recourse TASC, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.
- Volunteers of America Upstate New York (Monroe County): \$179,900 for Re-entry Education, Coaching & Support, a specialized alternatives to incarceration program.

- Women's Opportunity Rehabilitation Center (Nassau County): \$201,100 for a defender-based advocacy program.
- EAC Inc.: \$294,000 for Nassau TASC, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.

- Rockland County: \$90,300 for the Rockland County Adult Misdemeanor Drug Court, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.

- Project MORE Inc. (two grants): \$362,851 for Dutchess County Women’s Reporting Center (a program serving a specialized population); and \$238,596 for a probation violation residential center.

New York City

- Child Center of New York: \$303,286 for a pre-trial release alternatives to incarceration program.
- Center for Community Alternatives, Inc. (two grants): \$249,100 for Client Specific Planning, a defender-based advocacy program; and \$500,000 for Crossroads, an alternatives to incarceration program.
- Community Mediation Services, Inc.: \$250,000 for Community Mediation Services, a defender-based advocacy program.
- EAC Inc. (two grants): \$950,000 for New York City TASC, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities-model program; and \$623,500 for New York City TASC Mental Health Diversion, a program serving a specialized population.
- Fortune Society Inc.: \$200,000 for Residing Hope, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.
- CASES: \$500,000 for an enhanced behavioral health alternatives to incarceration program (a program serving a specialized population).
- Bronx Addiction Services Integrated Concepts System (BASICS), Inc.: \$384,208 for the Basics Residential Stabilization Center, a probation violation residential center.

North Country

- St. Lawrence County: \$196, 596 for a pre-trial release alternatives to incarceration program.
- Watertown Urban Mission: \$101,296 for the Bridge Program, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.

Western New York

- Niagara County Probation Department (two grants): \$109,917 for the Niagara County Alternative to Jail Detention Program, a pre-trial release program; and \$88,066 for the Niagara County TASC Expansion Project, a Treatment Accountability for Safer Communities model program.
- Community Services for the Developmentally Disabled (Erie County): \$186,188 for a Developmentally Disabled Offender Program, a program to serve a specialized population.
- Allegany and Cattaraugus territories of the Seneca Nation of Indians: \$127,245 for a Native American-focused alternatives to incarceration program, a program serving a specialized population.
